The Dangers of Carbon Monoxide...

Many people do not know they've been exposed to dangerous levels of carbon monoxide until they experience symptoms such as headache, dizziness, fatigue, confusion, increased heart rate and rapid breathing. If you or those around you develop such symptoms, leave the building immediately and call 9-1-1. Those exposed to high levels of carbon monoxide will often slip into unconsciousness and eventual death.

Defective furnaces can vent carbon monoxide into living quarters, so it is very important to have furnaces serviced at the beginning of every heating season.

Check, or have a professional check your chimney for any blockages. Consider installing carbon monoxide detectors in your dwelling.

If you lose power and cannot run your heating system, **NEVER** use barbeques or outdoor heaters to cook indoors or heat your home. These appliances give off odourless, invisible and deadly carbon monoxide gas. Only use appliances that are intended for indoor use. If you use a generator, follow the manufacturer's safety and operating instructions fully!

Cooking Safety Starts with YOU

Unattended cooking is still the number #1 cause of fires in Ontario!

- » Watch what you heat always stay in the kitchen when you are cooking.
- » Wear tight-fitting or rolled up sleeves when cooking. Loose, dangling clothing can catch fire.
- » Keep utensils, cloths, paper towels, anything that burns a safe distance from the stove.
- » If you have a small grease fire on the stove, slide a lid over the pot and turn off the stove, Water and grease don't mix!
- » Hungry after school? Stay in the kitchen when heating snacks. Turn off stove if you leave.
- » To watch fire safety awareness videos for students, visit knowfire.ca
- » Running late? Don't let the bustle distract you. Always stay alert when cooking.
- » Keep your eye on the pot. Don't let TV distract you. Use a timer to remind you when cooking
- » Drink responsibly when cooking. Alcohol is a factor in many home fires.
- » If you have a fire in the kitchen, get out immediately and call 9-1-1
- » Remember that when we change the clocks for daylights savings time, its time to change the batteries in your detectors
- » Always test your smoke and CO alarms monthly, this is to ensure they are in good working condition.
- » Smoke and CO Alarms don't last forever! The average smoke alarm has a life span of approx. 10 years and then it needs to be replaced. The average CO alarm has a life span of 7-10 years.
- » Remember that a lot of CO Alarms have a battery backup system in place and require annual battery changes. If you don't change the battery you could end up with false alarms, check your owner's manual for specifics for your alarm.
