CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS

Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

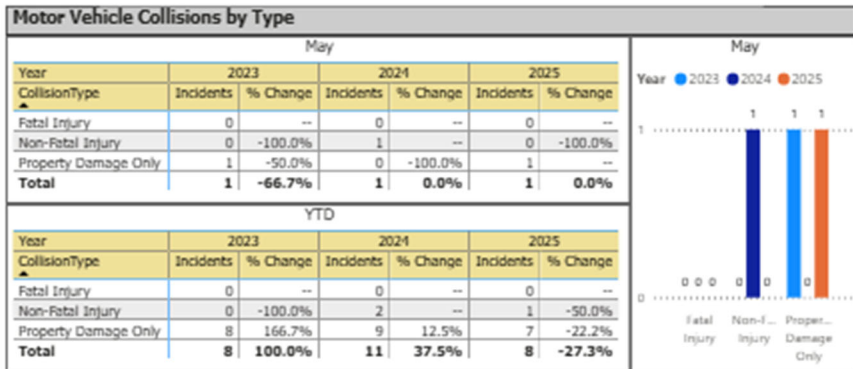
Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

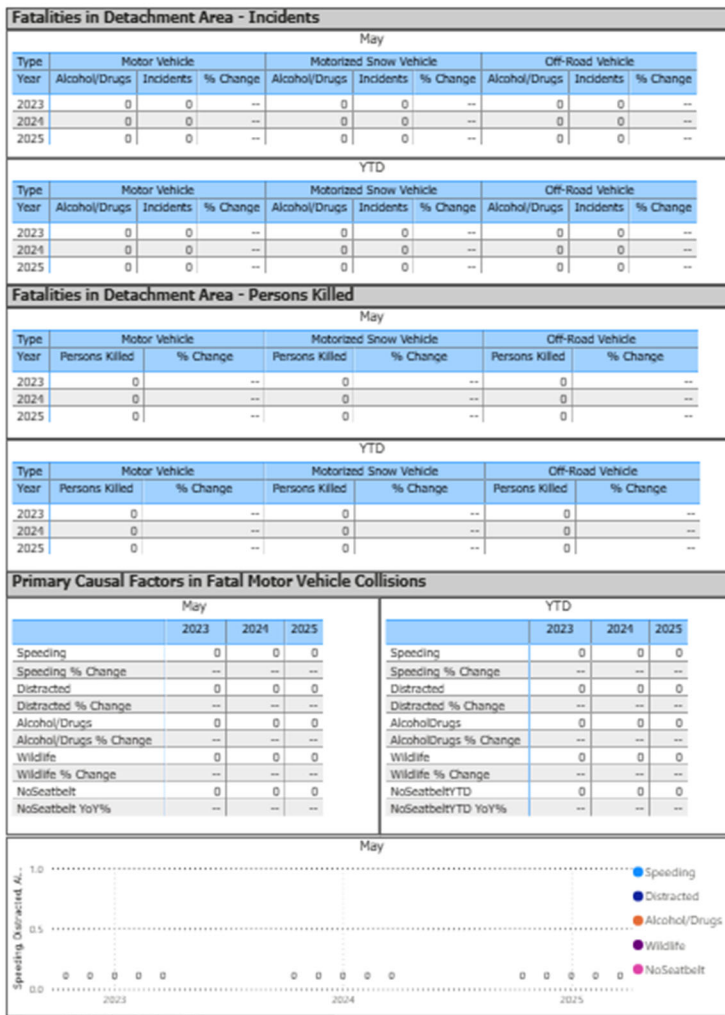
Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

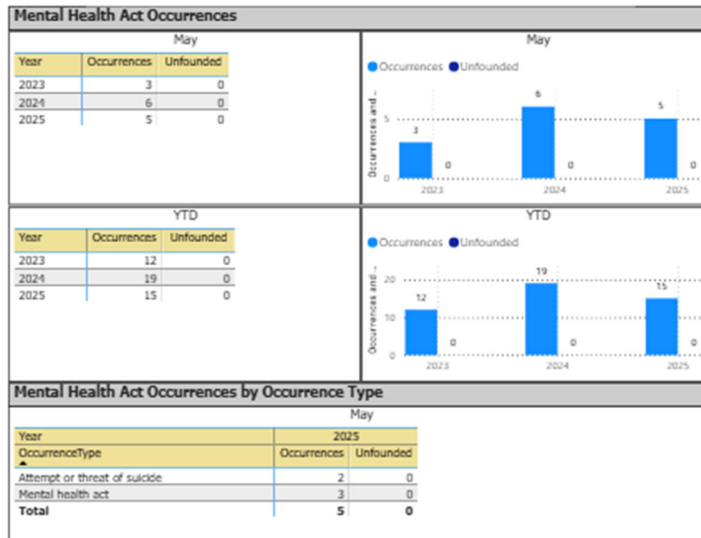
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Youth Charges by Disposition Type





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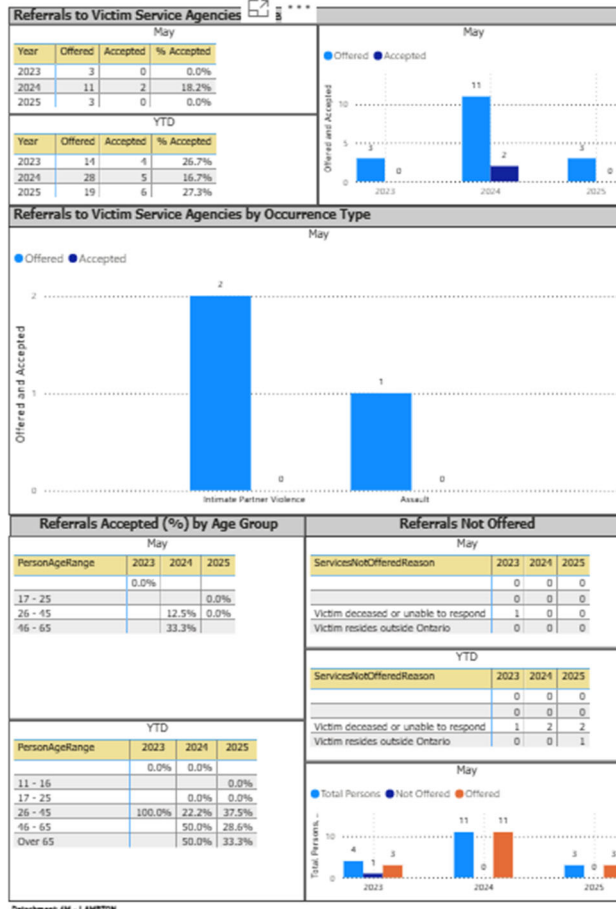


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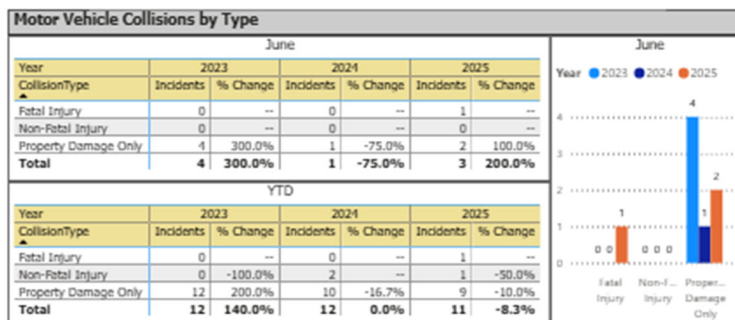

- The CEO showcased the enforcement efforts of Lambton OPP members in cases of traffic stops and impaired driving offences in May & June.
- CEO attended multiple Recruit Ambassador check-in meetings as well as WR OPP CEO check-in meetings
- Continued to work on/posted an IPV resources video with Lambton OPP's Abuse Issues Investigator
- CEO continued to work with Walpole Island First Nation community members and agencies on numerous community events and initiatives.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

The School Resource Officers (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during September and October. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and at the end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including youth and the law, peer-to-peer relationships, bullying, social media awareness and safety. Careers in policing presentations were also presented to post-secondary aged students.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth

MAY

Point Edward

Youth crying and throwing chairs and plants in the school hallway. Upset over not getting picked up early. Youth calm upon Police and MCRT arrival. Youth apprehended and then admitted to Bluewater Health.

Petrolia

Family Dispute in which a youth had departed from home on foot and was late to return. Youth attended detachment and was subsequently given a ride home where units spoke with him and his parents. The dispute revolved around screen time being limited. Youth were advised that house rules need to be followed.

Petrolia

Youths were detained by property owner for trespassing. Police attended property earlier in relation to break and enter investigation. Youths advised they were cutting through the property. Youths located and trespassed from property. PON issued to male who invited other youths to the property.

Lambton Shores

Known female with suicidal ideas disclosed to 988 that she was planning on taking all her medication to overdose. Police locate female in Grand Bend area. Female discloses same suicide plan to police. Female apprehended under MHA and transported to the Hospital. Female kept by Hospital.

St. Clair Township

Young male located walking on Cameron St. in Corunna only wearing one shoe. Male is non-verbal and alone. Police located residence of youth. Parents' unaware child has been missing for approx. 1 hour. Third, similar occurrence within the past few weeks. CAS notified.

Lambton Shores

Youth's friend messaged her that she was going to commit suicide. No plan mentioned. Female currently at grandmother's place. Police attended with MCERT. No plan. Going through difficulties with school, social media and drug issues in the family. Supports offered, coping habits discussed. No grounds for apprehension.

St. Clair Township

Police received a call from the Principal at Sir John Moore in Corunna. Ongoing issues with a student at school. The student has been screaming, swearing and disruptive at the school but had since calmed down. The Comp advised the student yelled something about the Comp not touching her. The Comp and witness advised no hands on occurred. Comp wanting incident reported to Police and student to be suspended from school. Ongoing issues and supports in place.

Lambton Shores

The complainant was reporting his son was assaulted by a supply teacher. Youth is 14 years old. Investigated by Police, and there was no intent for an assault. School talked with students that were in the classroom. No one could verify an actual assault. Principal updated.

Plympton- Wyoming

Lambton OPP advised of break and enter in progress in Camlachie. Paladin Security reported that an alarm was active and there were signs of entry. Police attended. Signs of entry through school window. Two youth observed running from the building. Youth located and identified, spoken to by Police and turned over to parents.

Lambton Shores

Assault at NLSS during lunch hour. Male party was jumped by a female party. Male youth walked away. Incident reported to V.P. and Police. The student was suspended for 5 days by school.

Petrolia

One student raised some concerns over an incident with another student meanwhile they worked on the photos for the yearbook. The student believes the other student took a picture when she was bending down. Video footage reviewed. If a picture was taken it was not from behind. No way of telling if student took a picture. An educational conversation scheduled by the school with students, parent and OPP on the 13th of May.

Petrolia

Staff from Perspective Youth Services contacted the police to report a fight between two residents. One male sustained a cut to his head. Male sent to hospital. Police investigation revealed the fight was not consensual. Further the aggressor struck the victim in the head with a metal thermos. Accused arrested and charged.

Plympton- Wyoming

911 call advising of a youth female that attended an address and assaulted a male. Male was assaulted and a door was slammed on his ankle, causing a severe laceration. EMS declined. Audio statement obtained. Police attended an address in Sarnia, arrested and released female.

Petrolia

Police dispatched to disturb the peace, complainant male banging on walls and yelling. Members attended and spoke with male who was at the home alone and yelling due to his frustration about various life issues. Determined not a threat to himself, but agreed to have MCRT follow up.

Lambton Shores

Complainant reported her son is being bullied at school and the school isn't taking care of the problem. Police contacted the youth guardian, she advised that she has a meeting with the school, and they are taking care of the situation.

Warwick

Mother worried her daughter may be suicidal. Police located daughter no mental health concerns, no safety concerns, positive police interaction. MCRT to reach out to daughter, mother educated.

Petrolia

Walk-in at detachment. The complaint states that one of his employees was assaulted by youth during his lunch hour. The Objects were pop-its. Youth flicked three of them, and one struck the employee behind the counter. The complainant spoke to youth and gave a verbal trespass. Complainant requesting police to speak to youth and his parents to have a discussion of conduct for youths and to provide a formal letter.

St. Clair Township

Complainant had been texting Kids Help Phone, advising that she wanted to kill herself by overdosing on her depression medication. Police and MCRT attended and spoke at length. The complainant had felt better after talking to Kids Help Phone but still struggling. Provided many resources and parents aware. Follow up to be conducted, the complainant safety planned and going to speak with her parents.

Warwick

Caller reported two males had entered a feed mill that was closed. at the two males had left the scene on foot. Police attended and spoke to witnesses that lead to the location of one male. Police spoke to him, and he provided the

whereabouts of the second male. The owner of the mill did not want to press charges. Both youths were spoken to and warned. The parents of the males were also notified.

Petrolia

Police spoke with parents who reported concerns for their child. Parents informed Police the child has made numerous accusations regarding assaults. Child is asking for \$2000 monthly, the child has moved out of parent's house, child will be homeless soon, Child is now living with Aunt and 2nd cousin.

For the month of May, there were 8 occurrences relating to mental health/suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages **13-17 years**.

There were 3 motor vehicle collision occurrences during the months of May involving youths **16-17 years of age**.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in **3** youths being warned and **30** Provincial Offence Notices given under the Highway Traffic Act. Youths ranged from 16-17 years of age.

JUNE

Bosanquet

Police were dispatched to a marine call for service where three children had drifted away from shore on a raft. The children were brought back to shore without incident and declined medical attention. All youth's Parents were notified of their children's safety.

Corunna

Police received a 911 advising that a youth had attended their residence and stated his father needed an ambulance. Police and EMS attended. The youth's father was suffering from an allergic reaction. Father recovered from reaction and was not transported by EMS.

Bosanquet

Police received a call for a well being check on a youth that had been stung by a bee and was still at school. Police attended the school and spoke with the principal and student. The student was observed in good health, provided and ice pack for the sting and had no signs of an allergic reaction.

Alvinston

Police received an ongoing custody dispute with an allegation of abuse. Caller did not want Police interviewing the youth but wanted the report to go to CAS. CAS and Family court system are continuing to deal with the dispute.

Corunna

The complainant called Police to advise that she had her friend staying at her residence but wanted her to move out. The investigation revealed that threats to life and property were disclosed, and grounds were formed to charge the complainants roommate.

Warwick

Police received a 9-1-1 call from a youth reporting an altercation with his nanny. Police attended and learned that the youth was not happy with following the rules the nanny had put in place at the direction of his father. The youth's father was contacted, and the two parties were separated for the day and will try things again tomorrow.

Wyoming

Police received a 3rd party call report of suicide. Police were advised that a youth had been making suicidal comments on Tiktok. Police attended spoke with the youth and observed the Tiktok posts. The youth was apprehended under the mental health act, transported to the hospital with his father, assessed and released. (MHA)

Forest

The complainant contacted Police to advise that her 10-year-old son was not listening and wanted Police to attend to speak with him. The youth could be heard playing calming in the background. The complainant then advised that the youth was no longer causing an issue and was getting ready to school and Police were not required.

Bosanquet

Police received a call stating that a student at the school was "out of control". Police attended where the student de-escalated. No parties were injured, and the students mother attended and took the student to see his counselor.

Bosanquet

Police received a call for a reported possible drowning at the beach. It was advised that one youth had been removed from the water and one youth was unaccounted for. Both you located and transported to hospital.

Dawn Euphemia

Police were advised that a youth had ran away from school and entered the bush lot at the back of the property. Containment was set up, K9 and ERT were dispatched. Police intercepted the youth and returned them to school. No injuries were reported by the youth and MCRT and CAS were engaged as the youth struggles with their mental health. (MHA)

Forest

Police received a call for a trouble with youth over an incident that occurred over the weekend. Snapchat group messages were created which made the youth upset with the conversations. Parties spoken to and educated was provided on online safety and bullying.

Brooke-Alvinston

Lambton O.P.P were dispatched to a trouble with youth call where the complainant is struggling with her son's behaviour fighting and using vape pens. Police attended spoke with all parties and external resources (counselling) were agreed upon. School resources officers were updated to follow up and check on youth.

Forest

Police received a call from a Parent advising that another youth had sent threatening text messages to their child via Snapchat. All parties were spoken to and accused youth was diverted to rebound. Online safety and bullying education were provided to all parties.

Forest

Police received call from a parent that their child was home alone, and two other youth were trying to get into the residence. Youth were known to the child, did not gain entry and fled on bicycles prior to Police arrival. Youth were identified and charged.

Petrolia

Police received a call that a youth was destroying property and attacking a staff member at a group home. Police attended and observed evidence that the staff member had been attacked by the youth. The youth was charged, and CAS was to attend to arrange alternate living arrangements for the youth.

Petrolia

The complainant called to advised that she had been “jumped” by two other youth and was currently at the hospital. Police attended, spoke with the complainant and observed visible injuries. Police located the accused who was arrested and charged for the incident. All parents of the youth involved notified of the incident.

Petrolia

Police spoke with the complainant who advised that a student had informed them that they felt threatened by another student at school over an incident that occurred on the weekend. The investigation revealed that a student had made a threat while holding a multi-tool. There were no safety concerns with the complainant or their mother and the Youth who had made the threat was charged and diverted from the incident.

Petrolia

Police received a call that two students got into a physical incident where one student attempted to choke another. The youth and parent did not want to proceed with charges or a Police investigation. The youth attended the hospital for assessment and no injuries sustained.

Grand Bend

Police observed a youth trespassing and engaging in a prohibited activity. Police spoke with the youth who refused to identify herself to Police. The youth lied about her age. The identity of the youth was obtained, and her father was contacted who attended and picked her up.

Thedford

The complainant called to advise of on-going issues with youth attending her residence and knocking on her door. Patrols were made with negative results and youth were not located. Follow up was conducted and youth were spoken to, and education was provided to stop knocking on other’s doors.

St. Clair Township

Police received a call requesting a well being check on their child. Police attended and it was determined that the youth reside in Sarnia. Youth spoke to and all appears in order and the youth is staying with a friend’s family in Sarnia.

Petrolia

Police received a walk into complaint to detachment. A youth wanted to advise of a break and enter they were involved in. Statements were obtained and other youth information was provided. Youth were diverted for incident.

Petrolia

Police received a 3rd party complaint with concerns for the youth's mental health. Police spoke with the youth and the youth's friends and family. No suicidal concerns voiced. Youth's family to monitor mental health and call back if required. (MHA)

Warwick

Sarnia P.S. MCRT team had been incident with you. Sarnia P.S. MCRT reached out to O.P.P. MCRT for follow up with youth who reside in the county. O.P.P. MCRT contacted the youth and their family. Resources were provided and the family was appreciative of MCRT engagement and follow up. (MHA)

Bosanquet

Police received a 3rd party call from security advising that a youth had approached them stating she had been assaulted. Police attended and the youth did not want any Police involvement. The other youth involved had left the area prior to Police arrival. The investigation suggested that the incident had been a consensual fight, EMS was declined, and no further Police action was required.

Warwick

Police received a call that the complainant's son had been threatened online from an Instagram account. The youth had provided an unknown party an intimate image who then requested payment or they would distribute the image. A common online scam. Advice was provided, social media was deleted, and a new phone number was to be obtained.

Petrolia

Police received a call reporting that the Complainant's son had sent intimate images to an account on Instagram. The unknown account then requested payment for the images to not be posted on social media. The images were posted, and advice and education were provided.

Plympton-Wyoming

Police received a 3rd party delayed call for a report of suicidal comments on Tiktok. Youth was located, spoken to and no grounds for apprehension were formed. The youth and family advised of supports that were in place already and no further resources were required at this time. (MHA)

Thedford

Police received a report of a threat of suicide. Police attended and it was revealed that a youth had taken multiple prescription pills. EMS attended and transported to hospital for medical and mental health assessment. (MHA)

Grand Bend

Police received a complaint that a vessel was overloaded with people and that there were no life jackets on board. Police attended and spoke with all parties who were cooperative. It was advised that they would be following the rules and obtaining the safety equipment required. All parties warned for their infraction.

Enniskillen

Police called to a family dispute between father and son from 3rd hand information. Police attended and located the youth. Police spoke with the youth and his father. All parties agreed upon the youth staying at his grandparents while things calm down. Youth provided transportation.

For the month of June there were 6 occurrences relating to mental health involving youth ages 13-17 years of age.

There were 2 motor vehicle collisions during the month of June involving youth ages 16-17 years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, and a combination of 57 provincial offenses notices and warnings were given under the Highway Traffic Act to youth. Additionally, there were 8 Compulsory Automobile Insurance Act provincial offences notices and warnings, 6 Canada Shipping act infractions, and 16 infractions to the Liquor Licence and Control Act, all relating to youth.

CRIME & TRAFFIC – MAY/JUNE

AREA CRIME SERGEANT

- Crime members are investigating impaired driving causing death/bodily harm involving a 6-year-old child and 8-year-old child.
- Crime members and OPP Criminal Investigation Branch continue investigating a conspiracy to commit murder and have charged two youths. The matter is before the courts.
- Crime members and OPP Criminal Investigation Branch are still investigating Andrew Chute homicide at the Marthaville Conservation area.
- Crime members are investigating missing person Deanna Timms. \$50000 reward being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of whoever is responsible.
- Multijurisdictional auto theft case involving a Lambton County resident victim continues. Police have seized a substantial number of vehicles, but numerous vehicles remain uncovered. 4 arrests have been made, and a Preliminary Hearing has been requested by the accused parties.
- Arkona Bank robbery investigation continues, arrested have been made and disclosure is being prepared.
- 36 Fraud Investigations.
- 4 Criminal Harassment investigations.
- 10 Sexual Assaults were investigated.
- 7 Sudden Deaths were investigated.
- 25 Benchmark Crimes were investigated.

CSCU SERGEANT

- During the months of May and June 2025 Lambton CSCU investigated 14 occurrences.
- Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 41 charges.
- Lambton CSCU wrote 6 warrants for drug trafficking investigations. The unit completed 6 warrant service entries (including assists).

- Lambton CSCU conducted a drug trafficking investigation on Walpole Island. Persons arrested: 2; Persons charged: 2; Charges: 9. Charges include Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking, Possession of Ammunition contrary to Prohibition Order, Breach of Probation, Possession of a Controlled Substance. Lambton CSCU had been conducting surveillance and formed grounds to arrest the male accused. Tactics and Rescue Unit conducted the entry on a S.11 CDSA search warrant. Lambton CSCU seized Fentanyl, Cocaine, & Methamphetamine, drug trafficking indicia and a quantity of cash. Total value of seizure: \$8,432.
- Lambton CSCU conducted a drug trafficking investigation in South Lambton. Lambton CSCU conducted physical surveillance forming grounds for 3 parties for drug trafficking. Tactics and Rescue Unit conducted the entry on two S.11 CDSA search warrants. Persons arrested: 6; Persons charged: 3; Charges: 6. Charges include Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking x2, Fail to Comply with Release Order. Also, two males had warrants for their arrest - they were returned. Lambton CSCU seized a small quantity of Fentanyl and Cocaine, drug trafficking indicia, and a large amount of Canadian currency. Total seizure value - \$16,650.
- Two Lambton members were on courses/training for 2 weeks each.
- Lambton CSCU assisted with the Major Event backfill for Grand Bend. Laying several LLCA and other Provincial Offences, also an Impaired Driving Charge.
- Lambton CSCU assisted Elgin-Middlesex CSCU, Grey Bruce CSCU and Essex CSCU with a S.11 CDSA warrant entries and searches regarding a drug trafficking investigation.
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis also writing search warrants to download and search cellphones related to drug trafficking investigations.

TRAFFIC

- During this reporting period OPP members conducted 47 traffic enforcement initiatives
- Fifteen (15) PON's were issued and Fifty (50) written warnings
- There were 18 motor vehicle collisions
- Ten (10) RIDE Programs were conducted
- Three (3) Impaired Drivers were arrested

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Using technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
