CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

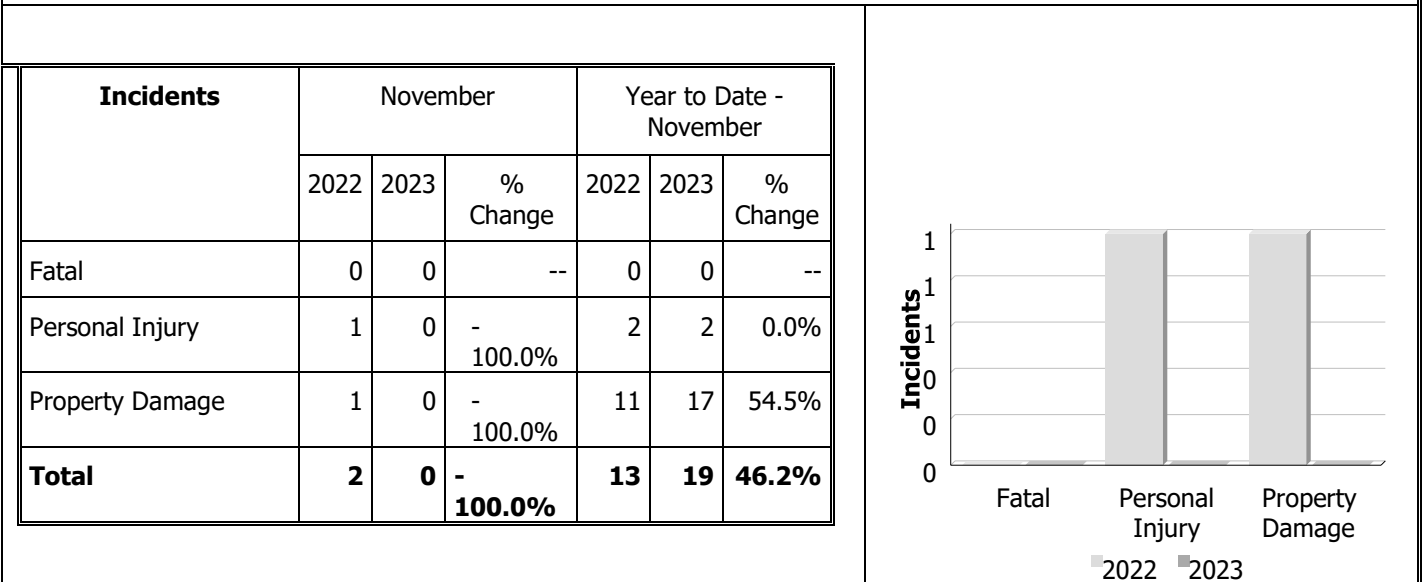
Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

Motor Vehicle Collisions by Type



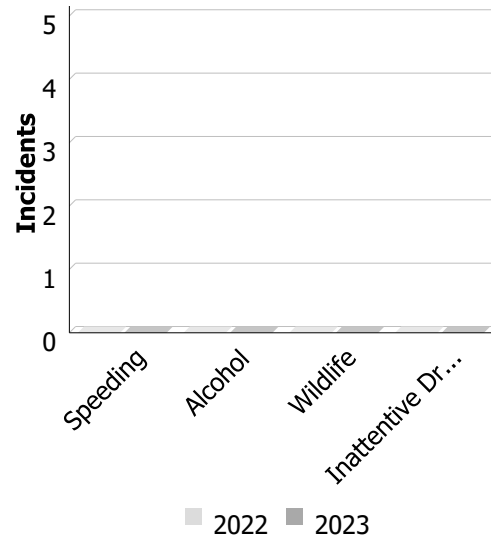

Motor Vehicle Collisions by Type



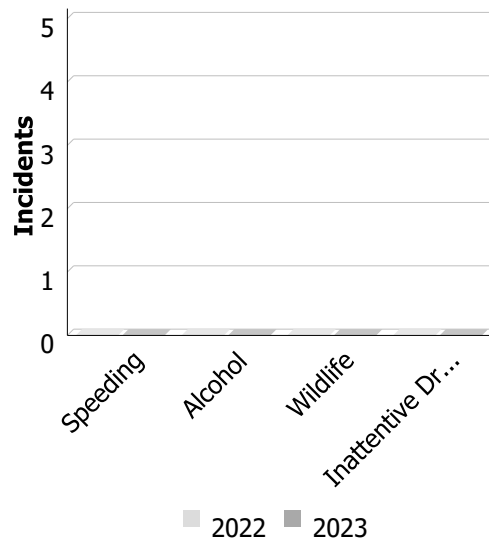

Community Safety /Media Relations

November and December 2023 – Point Edward focus

Objectives of the CSO/Media Relations

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted persons; with proven success.
- Prepare and distribute media releases in relation to major incidents throughout Lambton County.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of **41 media releases** were distributed for the month of **November**.

- Two specific to Point Edward events.

A total of **32 media releases** were distributed for the month of **December**.

- Two specific to Point Edward events.

PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- On November 15, the CSO presented 'Fight Fraud' to residents of the Royaleigh apartments in Wyoming. Roughly 35 in attendance.
- On November 21, the CSO hosted a Beavers troop in Corunna for a detachment tour where the kids learned about police officers, what equipment they carry and their police cars.
- A winter car safety kit presentation was planned for November 24 at a Lambton County Library but had to be rescheduled due to renovations.
- November and December saw multiple posts in relation to the OPP Festive RIDE season and results of those RIDE programs.
- Posts were added to all social media accounts in December after complaints were received about vehicles not stopping for school busses in Plympton-Wyoming.

OTHER NEWS:

- The CSO, and other members of Lambton OPP attended the Point Edward Remembrance Day ceremony, which was posted on social media.
- A post was added to social media about members of Lambton OPP participating in the first annual 'T2MJ (Talk 2 Me Johnny) Ruck', raising awareness for military and first responder mental health.
- A release was posted about a stunt driver, who was caught by the OPP Helicopter in November.
- Social media posts were added to all platforms, seeking a witness in an impaired driver investigation in December.
- November and December saw multiple posts in relation to Cops for Cans, Operation Christmas Tree and Toy/food drives throughout the county.
- Social media posts were added about the OPP CAMSAFE program, if residents have external security cameras, they can register their address on the website to enable a more efficient police canvass in the event of crime in the area. [Camsafe.ca](https://www.camsafe.ca)

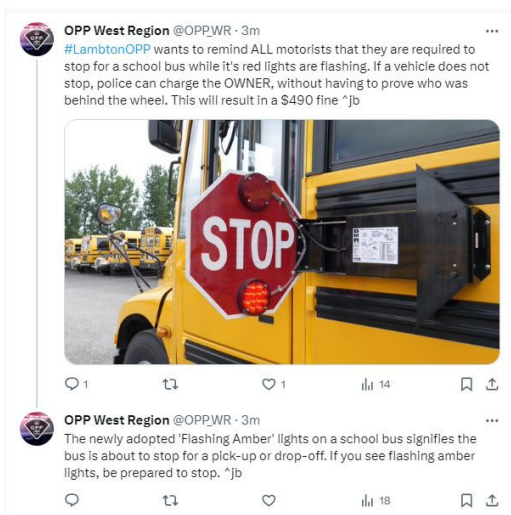

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2023

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during November and December. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including youth and the law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety. Careers in policing presentations were also presented to post-secondary aged students.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions as well as driver safety.

NOVEMBER 2023

Point Edward-12-year-old male was assaulted by another 12-year-old male at local elementary school. Police were engaged. Resources provided. No injuries sustained. Community programming implemented as well as School Resource Officers to conduct presentations in numerous classrooms in near future on “bullying”.

Petrolia – Parent advised School Resource Officer of on-going issues between her son 15 and another male at the school 14-years old. SRO spoke to parents and youths involved. Warnings were issued for harassment.

Forest- 16-year-old male youth lost his father in a motor vehicle collision and has no relationship with his mother. Youth was never registered at birth and is having difficulty obtaining a valid identification. SRO approached by several people in the community to help youth. Contacts made, youth on his way at obtaining first piece of identification.

Two male youths ages 14 and 15 were involved in a consensual physical altercation at a local high school off the school grounds. No injuries sustained. School engaged. SRO spoke with all parties involved including parents. Both youths were diverted to a community program.

St Clair- 2 17-year-old youths playing with an unloaded BB gun. Turns out there was one BB inside that was chambered and accidentally discharged striking the second male youth. The male was transported to hospital by ambulance to have the small pellet removed. No other injuries reported. All parties involved including the youths parents were spoken to by Police and educated on safety surrounding weapons.

Oil Springs-14-year-old female reports a sex assault involving her 21-year-old ex-boyfriend. The Crime unit was engaged. The investigation revealed that the female was giving misleading information as she was upset her ex-boyfriend was now dating someone else. No safety concerns.

Grand Bend-Police received a call about a suspicious person at a local elementary school. Police contacted the complainant who advised that her 13-year-old daughter was approached by a fellow student's mother and confronted regarding possible bullying. The school Principal was engaged. An internal investigation took place. No further action necessary by Police. No safety concerns.

Mother reporting her 11-year-old son is struggling with mental health. Behaviour has recently been escalating to wanting to find knives within the home and threatening to kill his mother and his brother. Police and MCRT Unit attended. The youth was apprehended under the Mental Health Act and formed at local hospital for further evaluation. Additional supports offered to the family.

For the month of November, there were **5** occurrences relating to mental health involving youths ranging from **11- 17** years of age.

There were **3** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of November involving youths **17** years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in **5** youths being warned under the HTA/CAIA, while **6** youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the Highway Traffic Act.

No youths were reported missing during the month of November.

DECEMBER 2023

Enniskillen – A 17-year-old youth was driving on the 7th of December with only a G1 class and did not have a licenced driver with him. The 17-year-old was charged with “unaccompanied by qualified driver” under the Highway Traffic Act. The youth was also given several warnings under the Highway Traffic Act. On December 15th, 2023 the same youth was caught driving again with no accompanying driver. The youth again was ticketed for this offence as well as several other Highway traffic Act offences. No warnings were issued during the second offence. The youth has been given a trial notice and will appear before the Provincial Courts.

Point Edward – A 63-year-old man chased down two 12 year old youths. The male brandished a knife and threatened the youth. The man was arrested and charged. The accused will appear in Criminal court at a later date.

St Clair Township – Two youths were located on the top of a building. The youths were spoken to and warned on safety and trespassing. No charges were laid.

St Clair Township - A school in St Clair Township called police when a 9-year-old took off. Several officers attend the scene, and it was found the youth was struggling with mental health issues. The youth ran from police several times. Police located the youth and returned her to the foster home.

St Clair Township – A group of youth ages 13 to 15 were intoxicated by alcohol and threatening a resident. Police located the three youths, who can be described as intoxicated and uncooperative. All three youths were arrested. The youths were later turned over to their parents.

Sombra - 4 youths aged 12 were caught throwing stones at windows. Youths were warned and brought back to their parents.

Forest – On December 22, the Lambton School Resource officer organized a charity hockey game “OPP vs NLSS Students” in the Town of Forest. Several hundred people attended this event. A total of \$1735 was raised. The proceeds to the event went to “Relay for Life- Canadian Cancer Society”.

For the month of December, there were **5** occurrences relating to mental health/suicidal ideations, all involving youths aged **12-17 years**.

There were **3** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of December.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 12 youths being warned and 10 Provincial Offence Notices given under the Highway Traffic Act. Youths ranged from **16-18** years of age.

CRIME & TRAFFIC – NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2023

AREA CRIME SERGEANT:

- Members of the Lambton County Crime Unit investigated ongoing harassment complaint, multiple resources including MCERT engaged. Police still monitoring MHA concerns, not criminal at this point.
- Lambton County Crime investigated one Crypto Fraud. OPP continue with media releases, frauds continuing province wide.
- Lambton Crime investigating one investment fraud which started on Facebook.

CSCU SERGEANT:

- Lambton CSCU in conjunction with a shipping company intercepted a large package of Cannabis related products. Lambton CSCU seized the package worth approximately \$45,550 of illicit cannabis.

TRAFFIC:

OPP have an on-going focused patrol set up to track efforts on property crime occurrences; there have been numerous break and enters, mischief and other property crime occurrences, including the local hotels, which have had numerous occurrences of thefts from the property and parking lot areas.

Local business will be followed up with suggestions to increase their security measures. Police will also add to this by conducting additional patrols and ongoing checks. Pro-active patrols will be conducted to monitor any activity in the area as well identify any suspects to previous occurrences.

In December there were a few break, enter, theft and mischief occurrences with extensive patrols and proactive work done in the Point Edward area (approximately 100 occurrences). This includes, foot/cruiser patrol, and property checks. The results of these efforts resulted in an Impaired driving occurrence, a wanted person located on a warrant, from an unrelated matter to the previous occurrences and much more.

Also, as a result, a suspect from the earlier property crime occurrences was located and arrested.

Highway 402 also has regular patrols and police presence to monitor traffic flow due to traffic backups.

School patrols have been assigned every day.

RIDE programs continue during every shift to reduce impaired driving. There were 40 RIDEs conducted, which includes those funded with the municipal RIDE grant using paid duty officers. The results have been very good. RIDEs have been set up in numerous locations.

There were numerous traffic enforcement occurrences generated in different locations, with enforcement results.

CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's Citizen Self Reporting system.

Use this system to report:

1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
6. Theft under \$5,000
7. Driving Complaint

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
