CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

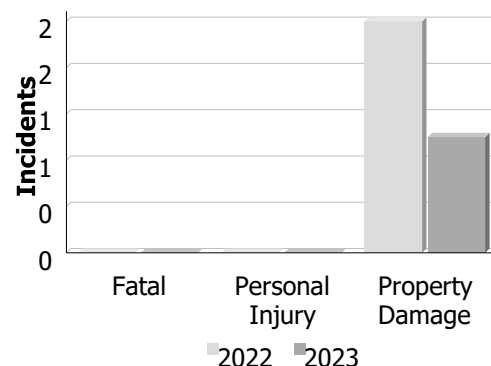
Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

A total of **44 media releases** were distributed for the month of **October**.

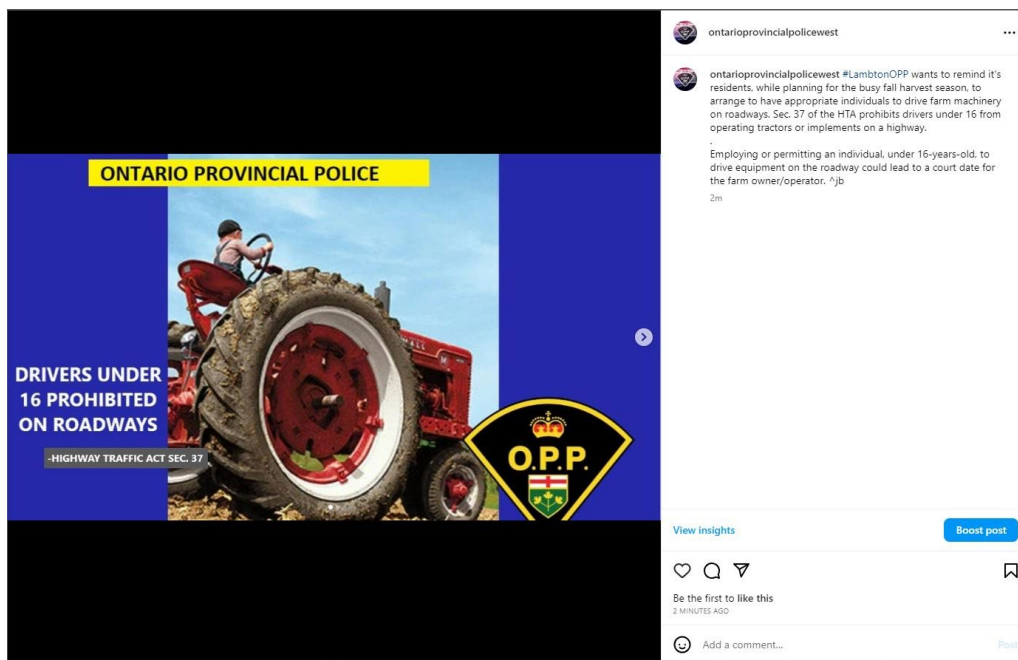

- On Oct 18, the CSO attended the Special Olympics Soccer tournament in Sarnia to support the athletes and make many new friendships.



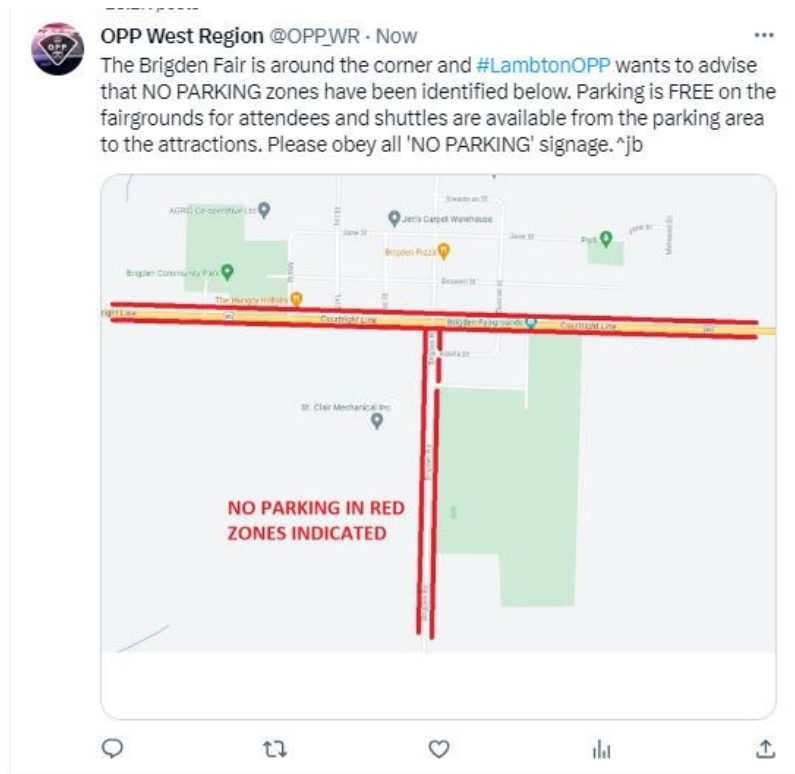

Blitz retirement – Oct 19, 2023

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during September and October. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including youth and the law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety. Bike safety presentations were also presented to elementary school aged students.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions as well as driver safety.

SEPTEMBER 2023

Point Edward - 15 year old male victim was assaulted by 17 year old male on the school bus, male charged and placed on conditions not to communicate with victim, all parents notified and appropriate resources offered

Wyoming-17-year-old male driving while under the influence of alcohol. Investigation completed. The male was arrested and charged accordingly.

2 x 17-year-old males engaged into racing their vehicles on a roadway during lunch hour. Police stopped both vehicles and the drivers were subsequently charged under the Highway Traffic Act with Race Motor Vehicle. Both youths are facing a pending court date.

Brigden- A mother advising her 10-year-old daughter was assaulted at the Brigden Elementary School by a 13-year-old female. Further investigation reveals of on-going issues between friend group. The female accused was diverted by way of community programming.

Petrolia – 15-year-old male was playing in class. Second male youth, 15 years old became escalated over the situation and assaulted the male youth outside of the school. The accused uttered threats to stab the victim. No knife was banished. After further Police investigation, youth advised he had no intentions of stabbing anyone. No injuries reported and the accused male was diverted by way of attending a community program.

14-year-old male punched in the face numerous times by 13-year-old male at a local high school. No injuries reported. Deemed nonconsensual. The accused male was located by Police at the school and arrested/charged.

St Clair-Report of a family dispute turning physical with son and father after taking away dirt bike privileges. Police separated parties without incident. MCRT attended and provided appropriate resources for the family.

Grand Bend- 16- and 17-year-old females cyber bullying a 40-year-old female. After numerous attempts of asking females to stop, Police were engaged. Both females were issued a warning to cease all contact.

For the month of September, there were **5** occurrences relating to mental health involving youths **17** years of age.

There were **2** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of September involving youths **17** years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in **10** youths being warned under the HTA/LLCA, while **10** youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the Highway Traffic Act/Liquor License Control Act.

There was 1, 16-year-old that was reported missing and subsequently being located.

OCTOBER 2023

Petrolia - Two youths assaulted a younger youth. The victim youth was injured and was transported to hospital. Both accused youths were arrested and charged. Both youths will be appearing in court at a later date.

Corunna - A disturbance was reported to police involving several youths. Officers investigated and found that a youth assaulted another youth. The suspect youth was arrested and charged with assault. The youth will be appearing in court at a later date.

St Clair Township - Four youths using Cannabis. One youth had a negative reaction and was transported to hospital.

Forest - Two youths that attend NLSS were out on the school lunch hour and began fighting in front of a local store. The fight was broken up by adults in the area. Both youths deemed they were in a consensual fight. Both youths were suspended from school. Youths were cautioned by police that the fight was consensual however met the definition of "causing a disturbance" and youths could be subjected to criminal charges should this occur again.

Forest - Three Elementary school youths stole another youth bicycle from the school property. As a result of the theft the bicycle was damaged. The suspect youths were found and diverted to the Sarnia Lambton Rebound Program.

For the month of October, there were **2** occurrences relating to mental health/suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages **13-17 years**.

There were **5** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of October, involving youths ages **16-17 years of age**.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 10 youths being warned and 3 Provincial Offence Notices given under the Highway Traffic Act. Youths ranged from 16-18 years of age.

CRIME & TRAFFIC – SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 2023

AREA CRIME SERGEANT:

- One sudden death reported in September an archaeologist working in the Village came across human remains, revealed to be historic in nature and incident, investigation will be completed by TMHC as per the OCC/OFPS office

CSCU SERGEANT:

- Lambton CSCU was involved in Physical Surveillance in relation to the B&E/Thefts at local Storage Unit facilities in Point Edward

TRAFFIC:

The OPP have numerous focused patrols set up in various locations in the county.

Areas of concern are being focused on and results will be collected to identify any issues.

Highway 402 also has regular patrols and police presence to monitor traffic flow with due traffic backups over the summer.

School patrols have been assigned every day.

Ride programs continue during every shift to reduce impaired driving, there were 4 impaired driving incidents during this reporting period.

There was a recent traffic campaign, it was very successful with officers working hard to promote traffic safety.

The Marine unit has been carried out regular patrols with both vessels.

The unit has had great results as well and the regular patrols have been noticed by the public and other agencies in the area. Along with the normal patrols, the unit has also focused on boating safety awareness by doing foot patrol in the marina to talk with other boaters to ensure they are aware of the equipment they require and answer any questions they may have.

There were numerous traffic enforcement occurrences generated in different locations.

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
